ABSTRACT

Andre Bazin's concept of cinematic realism serves as the foundation for the film's narrative construction. It also underpins the mise-enscene aesthetic, emphasizing authenticity using non-professional actors, realistic settings, and techniques such as long takes and deep focus. This 16-minute film serves as a reflective medium on the generation gap in interpreting learning, while encouraging audiences to recognize the importance of two-way communication between parents and children in the digital age.
